Finally, do not miss our guest speaker Carl Ernst on Sunday September 25. He is one of the world's foremost authorities on Islam. He will be speaking on his new book *Following Muhammad: Re-Thinking Islam in the Contemporary World*.

I am very excited about these new programs and initiatives at church. As students young and old prepare for a new semester of intellectual stimulation, we here at UCPC have much spiritual stimulation to look forward to. I am very grateful to be a part of it. It feels creative, exhilarating, and full of promise.

As a child, Lorraine Lewis loved the out-of-doors and enjoyed games like badminton and dodge ball. And she also liked to sit outdoors and read.

When Lorraine came to North Carolina to attend UNC, she decided to stay on and make her home here. North Carolina offered her mountains and beaches – enough

to satisfy her need for a constant connection with nature.

Lorraine loves to play tennis. “I enjoy the

rhythm and dance-like movements of tennis,” she says. Exercise and jogging are high on her list of favorite activities, as well. Even her chosen profession has to do with the health of body and mind. She is a practitioner of several kinds of energy work: Trager, Reiki, LaHo-Chi—as well as a licensed massage therapist.

According to her Web site (peacefulconnection.com), Lorraine supports people in “reconnecting and aligning with their divine nature, thus allowing them to naturally be in a positive flow of life energy.”

Asked about her current reading habits, Lorraine says she keeps several books going all the time, plus keeping up with journals, magazines and newsletters related to her work.

A book is a great friend, but a cat is a greater one, and Lorraine has a great cat: a green-eyed tabby named Pudlet, who found her when she was living in a cabin in the woods, and has become, in Lorraine’s phrase, “a very evolved cat.” Puds leads the way with lots of meditation. Lorraine says she knows when Pudlet is looking at her in a certain way that she needs to slow down.

In 1984 she met Donna Gulick, a teacher and healer who suggested that she might enjoy Unity Center of Peace Church. In 1992 Lorraine visited the church and realized that Unity teachings were a good fit for what she was already thinking. She attended the 4-T class, which she says was “life-changing in teaching me how to get out of the way and surrender to the power of the God-self.” She loves the way Mark focuses on aligning with the Christ-Consciousness. “I’m sort of a cosmic person,” she says, “I make a conscious effort to stay hooked up to Source energy.”

August Community Meeting Mentionables:

At the Community Meeting on August 7 we continued our discussion of the notion of “sanctuary.” The group unanimously wished to move forward with the concepts described in the “Statement of Being” (printed in last month’s edition of [Spirit Express](#)). We did not reach consensus, however, about how we will get the community as a whole to buy into the ideas of personal responsibility, spiritual safety and communal boundaries. It was suggested that Mark give a talk about it on a Sunday, which he is planning to do on September 4.

Machai St. Rain, Building and Grounds Co-Chair, and Pat Veenema discussed progress on the deck renovation project. They provided a rough estimate on how much it would cost to put a translucent UV-reflecting roof over part of the deck.



Coming soon The Rumi Festival began in 1998 in honor of the birthday of Mevlana Jelaluddin Rumi, world-famous thirteenth century mystic and poet whose great writing, the *Mathnawi* or *Mesnevi* is still being translated and loved all over the world. The Festival is a long weekend of *sohbet*, or spiritual discourse, with Rifa’i Marufi teacher Sherif Baba and guest teachers, *zikr*, the Ceremony of Divine Remembrance, including turning by “whirling dervishes” of the Mevlevi Order founded by Rumi, musical performances, workshops, and fellowship. It is an opportunity to bring together members of the Order from around and outside of the United States, and for local people to join us and share our joy.

This year’s festival will be held from September 29 through October 2. This year’s highlights include four mornings of discourse with our beloved Sherif Baba and guest teacher Asha Greer of the Ruhaniyyat, a traditional Rifa’i Marufi *zikr*, musical performances by the Turkish Osman Aksu Ensemble and the Persian Naghmeh Ensemble, a workshop on turning, and a Unity Zikr where the traditions of different Orders merge into one celebration of unity. This year’s festivities will also include a traditional Japanese Tea Ceremony, an auction to benefit the Rifa’i Marufi Building Fund, and a gathering on the site of our future Universal Center of Light in nearby Mebane. All events are open to the public; as Rumi said, “Come, come, whoever you are!” For more information, see our festival website at www.rumifest.com.

The Rifa’i Marufi Order of America (RMO) is a school of Sufi teaching. Sherif Catalkaya, or Sherif Baba as he is called, with a small group of students, established the RMO in Chapel Hill in 1992 and now ministers to groups across the United States, Canada, Turkey and Azerbaijan.

In an article for our newsletter, the *Flashlight*, Sherif Baba wrote about Sufism and the Rifa’i Marufi. He explained that Rifa’i Marufi is a branch of the Sufi path that works inside the existence and unity of Islam. Rifa’i is named for Ahmet er-Rifa’i, who founded the Order in the thirteenth century, and Fethel Marufi who, in the seventeenth century, expanded the teachings, knowledge and cultural scope. Universal Sufism began with the Prophet Elijah and Islamic Sufism began with the Prophet Muhammed, his family and companions. The Sufi way of understanding is to perform our duties and our service through love, respect and good conduct. The schools of Sufism, under many different names, are serving many peoples throughout the world. The purpose and goal is the peace and fellowship of humanity.

“Do not forget that our origin is one, our ancestry is one, our body is one, the breath that we take is one, our faces are one, and the creative power that we believe in—Allah—is one. And if we think in this way, then peace, love and friendship will come to light in this world. Allah is one and loves unity. Allah is beautiful and loves the beautiful.” (Sherif Baba, 1998).

Regardless of its origins or of the cloaks that it wears among its followers, Sufism is a path beyond the labels of religion. It is the central truth of all religions. It is a means of living a life of love and unity. It is a way to live, and to let be lived, the characteristics of compassion, justice, generosity, virtue and fellowship in the service of humanity.

Special Guest Speaker **Dr. Carl Ernst**

will speak on "**Understanding Islam Today**" at Unity Center of Peace Church during Sunday morning services September 25. Carl W. Ernst is a specialist in Islamic studies, with a focus on West and South Asia. His published research based on the study of Arabic, Persian, and Urdu, has been mainly devoted to the study of Islam and Sufism. His most recent book, *Following Muhammad: Rethinking Islam in the Contemporary World* (UNC Press, 2003), has received several international awards, including the 2004 Bashrahil Prize for Outstanding Cultural Achievement. His current projects include Muslim interpretations of Hinduism and the literary translation of the Qur'an.

He studied comparative religion at Stanford University (A.B. 1973) and Harvard University (Ph.D 1981), and has done research tours in India, Pakistan, and Turkey, and has also visited Iran and Uzbekistan. He has taught at Pomona College (1981-1992) and has been appointed as visiting lecturer in Paris (1991, 2003), Seville (2001), and Kuala Lumpur (2005). On the faculty of the Department of Religious Studies at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill since 1992, he has been department chair (1995-2000) and Director of the Carolina Center for the Study of the Middle East and Muslim Civilizations.

Carl Ernst is regarded as one of the leading authorities on Islam and we are fortunate to have a scholar of his caliber to speak with us at UCPC.
